





How silk fiber is harvested: The silkworm makes a cocoon, or "changing room" as they are referred to in the worm community. Between the time the worm seals himself inside the cocoon and before the moth tears his way out the cocoon is boiled in water. Unfortunately, the worm is killed in the process, but the cocoon is unraveled yielding one to two thousand yards of silk. It costs the lives of approximately 2,500 silkworms to harvest just one pound of silk.

What Is Fine Dust?


Fine Dust, specifically known as PM2.5, is particulate matter that can be found in the air that is incredibly small — a single particle has a diameter of less than 2.5 micrometers, which means you can easily fit forty fine dust particles across the width of a single strand of hair. Fine Dust size renders it practically invisible; it can only be detected by an electron microscope.

Several items within our home work as filters to trap the fine dust and keep it out of our breathing zone. These items, such as, carpeting, area rugs, upholstery, draperies, and blinds serve as *silent janitors*, working 24/7/365 to keep us healthy, but they need to be emptied of their pollution buildup regularly.
