
Empathy Between Legends





HOW TO PROPERLY WASH YOUR PET

"Moisture Mysteries: Why Your Chair Mat Might Be Trapping a Hidden Stink"



When it comes to commercial offices, particularly those located on the first floor or directly on a concrete slab, a musty odor under office chair mats is a relatively common issue. This odor is often a result of moisture accumulating under the mat, and understanding the cause starts with the concrete itself.

Concrete slabs have a network of tiny capillaries—think of them as microscopic channels—that allow moisture from the ground below to migrate upward through the concrete. This process is known as capillary action. Even though concrete appears solid, it is actually porous, and these capillaries can transport water vapor to the surface of the slab.

When carpeting is installed over concrete, it typically allows this water vapor to pass through the carpet fibers and evaporate harmlessly into the air. However, when a plastic chair mat is placed on top of the carpet, it creates a barrier that traps the moisture underneath. Since the plastic mat is impermeable, the water vapor cannot escape, leading to the accumulation of moisture under the mat. Over time, this trapped moisture can create a musty odor and potentially damage the carpet and mat.

The easiest and most effective solution to this problem is to drill several small holes in the plastic chair mat. These holes will allow the moisture to escape, preventing it from becoming trapped and eliminating the musty odor. By providing an outlet for the water vapor, you can maintain a healthier environment under the mat and preserve the longevity of the carpet.
